Project Areas

Love a Village works to reduce poverty and promote self-sustainability by partnering with Malawians in five key project areas:

- **Clean Water** - rope pumps and household water filters
- **Food Security** - farming, composting, fruits, veggies, livestock, forestation and fertilizer
- **Hygiene** - toilets, wash stations, and girls hygiene classes
- **Safe Shelter** - new construction, repair, tin roof installations
- **Education** - tuition scholarships, school supplies, and life skills training

Luhomero

Love a Village works in the village of Luhomero (pop. 5,000). Malawi is known as the Warm Heart of Africa and is one of the world's poorest nations (per person GDP is only \$226.50 USD). The village of Luhomero is in Malawi's neglected northern region.

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As I prepare for this experience, it's natural to consider what my goals are. I really want to understand the heart of Malawians and to show them God's love while I am there. I hope to better understand the challenges that families in Luhomero are facing and see the work that Love a Village is doing to meet those needs. I want to jump in and participate where I can. I really feel that I'm a part of the Love a Village team, so on this trip I would like to learn more about how we, as Love a Village Mission, can practically and effectively help the people of Luhomero for the long-term, become independent and self-sustainable.

While I'm looking forward to this experience, I think it will be very challenging to face the reality of extreme poverty. I live a privileged life here in Canada, and have a difficult time understanding what poverty means: a complete lacking of the resources to provide for the basic needs of life such as food, clothing and shelter. I know that it will be hard to see the truth and realize that my whole life I have done very little to change this reality. Matthew 25: 37-40 says, *"Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'"* Every time I read this verse I feel uncomfortable and I wonder how I will answer the Lord. This short two week trip is not an item on my list that can be checked off when I get home "OK God, I gave the thirsty something to drink." This trip is simply the next step in my walk of obedience to Him.
